I knew at the beginning of the year it would be hard to make it to every chapter, especially with planning a wedding in the fall, but I tried my hardest! In the fall, I visited Lambda Nu for their interchapter event, skyped into Theta Gamma's pledge meeting, and attended Nu's first continuing education program. This spring, I was fortunate to attend Delta Tau's formal, Tau's Third Weekend and Last Call event, Sigma's Bowl-a-Thon, Nu's Alumni BBQ, Epsilon's formal, Rho lota's family dinner, and Kappa's service event. I am still hoping to make it to Puerto Rico the end of May to see Pi Rho Fraters and our newly inducted Psi Fraters. I apologize to the chapters I did not make it to, but visiting chapters was by far one of the highlights of my year. I love seeing all of the amazing things the chapters are doing, and I thank all of the chapters for their hospitality.

I started the year off with several goals, all of which we were able to accomplish to some extent, and a few which we are still working on or can be continued in future years. My first goal was organization, for the Supreme board to become more effective with our work processes and better utilize technology to our advantage. We accomplished this through creation of Google roster spreadsheets for each undergraduate chapter, which were shared with the chapter officers as a means for the chapters and Supreme to more easily communicate roster updates for active Fraters, new Fraters, and graduating Fraters. Overall the rosters seemed to work very well and will be slightly tweaked moving forward. We created an active Frater email list, so we can easily disseminate information to all active Fraters vs. those registered on our website. This was a bit of a learning process to figure out the logistics and work through some kinks, but the list is now functional and should be useful as a means for communication in the future. The E-board members have been working on developing and compiling guidance documents for various Supreme positions, and next year's board will pick up where we left off to finish this task to hopefully ease the transition into each Supreme officer position. My second goal was effective execution amongst my board and appointed officers. I started the year with

communications early on to set clear expectations and

for each of the officers to establish their goals for the year. With periodic check-ins and monthly executive board calls, the officers overall did a great job in accomplishing their plans for the year, some of which will continue into next year. Details can be found in each officer's report, but I am extremely proud of my executive board and appointed officers; they have all worked extremely hard to push the fraternity forward, and I am thankful to have had a great team with whom to work. My third goal was to enhance the excitement within the fraternity as we approach our 100-year anniversary. We accomplished this with creation of the first Undergraduate Representative Blog on the AZO website, highlighting all of their travels throughout the year (which were many!). We put out video updates from Supreme through Facebook to highlight our efforts. A big part of accomplishing this goal was further development of our continuing education program, as we offered four two-credit CE webinar programs for active Fraters. I personally saw this create excitement amongst alumni Fraters, some of whom were inactive but decided to return to AZO largely due to this incentive. I strongly believe keeping our alumni involved and engaged is crucial to our success as a fraternity with the wealth of knowledge, skills, and network they bring to our organization, which can further enhance the development of our undergraduates. I am tremendously grateful for the efforts of my Sub-Directorums Tiffany Janajreh and Jonathan McLachlan in leading the Retention Committee and our continuing education efforts, respectively, which have been the driving forces behind our success with retention on both chapter and national levels. Although we didn't quite reach 1000 active Fraters, we are getting close, and several chapters are moving toward becoming mixed chapters or strengthening their alumni component! I personally could feel the excitement with each chapter visit, and I'm sure this will only get stronger in our 100th year. In closing, thank you to the P.S.D.s for their guidance during the year, whenever I needed anything. Special thanks to Izzat Janajreh, P.S.D. for being my Deputy and the P.S.D. I turned to most throughout the year; your support and advice was incredibly helpful, and I sincerely appreciate all you do for AZO. I would like to wish my deepest congratulations to Frater Tiffany Janajreh who will soon take the reins. I cannot wait to see what Tiffany and her board will accomplish; I know she will shine as Supreme Directorum with her passion for AZO, her organizational skills, and tremendous work ethic. Supreme 1st Sub-Directorum Report



Thank you once again to the Fraternity for electing me to the position of Supreme 1st Sub-Directorum. It has been a pleasure having the opportunity to serve AZO. This year has been marked by an extraordinary level of activity and we've seen many accomplishments on both chapter and national levels.

I have spent much of my time as 1st Sub-Directorum focusing on the

Retention Committee and working with a committee tasked to update our Directorum's Cup point system. Both of these tasks kept me quite busy throughout the year.

The Retention Committee held four conference calls with representatives from each undergraduate chapter in attendance to implement recommendations developed over the previous year. We started our year with the simple goal to attempt to retain at least 50% of the previous year's graduating class, and I am happy to report that we saw great success with this goal. I enjoyed working with the representatives from each chapter and was happy to help promote alumni growth. It will be important for future administrations to maintain this goal of retention and to continue the efforts of expanding our chapters' alumni components. More information regarding the Retention Committee's efforts and achievements can be found in my Retention Committee report.

My second focus was working with a committee to dissect the Directorum's Cup point system, and with the assistance of committee members, Diane Gomes, P.S.D., Supreme Deputy Izzat Janajreh, P.S.D., Supreme Signare Nicole Saracino, Supreme Director of Development Natalie Underdown, and Supreme Associate Undergraduate Representative Dan Haning, we spent the latter part of the fraternal year working towards creating recommendations of updating the current point system to reflect the fraternity's needs. Through a series of conference calls, we assessed the current Directorum's Cup requirements, recommended changes, and re-evaluated the point system. We have developed the framework for a point system that we feel is better defined and more encouraging for chapters to achieve the Directorum's Cup. A final report was created which I look forward to presenting at our upcoming National Convention.

As the fraternal year comes to an end, I am working on my third and final task, chairing the Awards Committee. As Chairman, I served as Mistress of Ceremonies for the Jay L. Pollock Supreme Undergraduate Award at the winter convention in Orlando, Florida and I would like to congratulate this year's recipient, Natalie Underdown. At this time I am in the process of collecting and compiling the needed documents from our 2020 Undergraduate Award nominees so that the Awards Committee can begin their selection process for the upcoming year. I want to take this time to congratulate each and every nominee, as being nominated by your chapter for this award is a great accomplishment in itself.

It has been a privilege to work with Directorum Parsons and the rest of the Supreme Board on what should be considered a remarkable year for our fraternity. Katelyn and I have had the opportunity to work closely on various projects this year, and I would like to thank her for all of her support and congratulate her on a job well done. I look forward to continuing to serve the fraternity and I hope to see everyone as we celebrate the fraternity's centennial in Philadelphia!

Retention Committee Report

I would like to begin by thanking Directorum Parsons for appointing me to chair the Retention Committee. This committee was added to the bylaws at this past National Convention and is made up of representatives from each chapter along with the AZO Direct Chair. The committee met four times via phone conference this past year and worked to achieve what we believed to be obtainable goals.

During the first quarter of the year, the primary focus was the retention of the graduating class of 2018. We set out with the goal for each chapter to strive to retain at least 50% of the previously active fraters from the graduating class. Chapters with established alumni components shared examples of letters and e-mails used to ask for dues and we developed a blanket letter/email for chapters to use in the future that they can customize to their needs. Because of the hard work and efforts of those chapter representatives on this committee, almost all of the chapters achieved the goal of at least 50% retention of their 2018 graduating class. Very big congratulations to the Tau Chapter that retained 100% of their graduating class and the Rho Chapter that saw their active alumni component grow by 228%!

Our secondary goal was to have our newer chapters begin to focus on developing an alumni component for their first group of alumni. Chapters with newer alumni were paired with established mixed chapters to allow for collaboration and mentoring. Again, thanks to the efforts of this committee, I am happy to report that Rho lota has their first active alumni members and Lambda Nu is in the beginning stages of an official alumni component. A very big congratulations goes to the Pi Rho and Delta Tau Chapters that both officially began alumni components to their chapters and elected alumni officers into positions.

Between our efforts in focusing on the retention of our newest graduated fraters and with the start of our new CE Webinar program being accessible only to active fraters, we can boast that the fraternity has the largest number of active fraters that it has had in recent years. By increasing retention at the chapter level first, we are well on our way of working towards this committee's long-term focus of increasing the engagement of all fraters nationally.

In closing, I am thankful to Supreme Directorum Parsons for allowing me to oversee this committee and its efforts this year. I look forward to continue watching this fraternity grow in the upcoming fraternal year.

I am currently looking to see if our current 501(c)(10) IRC designation still correctly applies to our organization due to recent expenditure types hitting our ledger and what a potential change may mean in regards to our investments. As a reminder, all recent, current and future Supreme Excheques need to ensure we are retaining our physical financial records for the amount of years that are required by the IRS. This includes reimbursement requests, invoices, payments and financial statements from each of the most recent five financial years (currently Fraternal Years 2013-2014 to 2017-2018) just in case a documentation audit is requested. If this ever occurs, they will probably focus on some of our larger convention expenses and maybe one or two of the larger reimbursements to our own members. It has been a pleasure to serve as co-chairs for the supreme advocacy committee. We are grateful to fraters from many chapters who joined us in our efforts to help promote the profession of pharmacy and draw attention to the importance of patient education and understanding in tackling our nation's growing opioid epidemic. We hope the initiatives this year carry into next year and AZO will continue to increase its professional and legislative presence. This year, the advocacy committee was divided into two subsets: the Opioid Epidemic Task Force led by Karli and General Pharmacy Advocacy led by Mallory. In the first half of the year, we dedicated time to skyping into chapter meetings to discuss the

importance of advocacy in our profession and explain the goals of our committee to interested fraters.

The Opioid Task Force met quarterly to discuss various initiatives and ideas for chapters to implement in their own communities. During National Pharmacist Month in October, we led a social media campaign to honor companies in the pharmaceutical industry doing their part to help raise awareness and increase understanding in light of the opioid epidemic. Throughout the year, chapter liaisons were able to reach out for assistance and advice regarding events they were planning in their communities. As a result, several events throughout the country took place through the work of this committee, and it has been rewarding to see the progress made throughout the year. Addison Sember of Theta Gamma, worked to hold an opioid education event in her community and several fraters from Tau were able to attend their annual opioid research symposium.

The committee subset dedicated to pharmacy advocacy met throughout the year to discuss different aspects of the policy process. We would like to thank the following committee fraters: Jarred Drown (Delta Tau), Wyatt Merrill (Nu), Amanda Bain (Tau), Brianna Shea (Tau) and Guarav Pathak (Epsilon). The goal of this committee was to provide fraters with a better explanation of the policy process so as an organization it can gain greater appreciation for the legislation that continues to allow pharmacy to progress and thrive. We decided to focus our efforts for the end of the year on two important pieces of legislation that will impact the profession of pharmacy and hopefully translate into positive health outcomes: H.R1614: The John S McCain Opioid Addiction Prevention Act, which aims to implement prescriptive restrictions and greater provider education to help decrease the circulation of opioids; as well as H.R 803: Improving Transparency and

Accuracy in Medicare Spending Part D Spending Act (DIR Fees), which serves to eliminate excess fees applied to successful claims. We look forward to finding new ways to engage chapters in this important legislation.

Frater Natalie Underdown, Lambda Nu RECIPIENT OF THE 2019 JAY L. POLLOCK UNDERGRADUATE AWARD

Natalie Underdown was born on March 27, 1995 in Portland, Maine to her parents Ann and Frank Underdown. She was raised and attended school in Cape Elizabeth, Maine where her parents and older brother, Frankie, still reside. Growing up she was often told that she had an "old soul," and bonded well with her mother through her faith and with her father through music. As a child and to this day, Natalie is known to be more introverted and observant, and due to feeling very connected and receptive of the emotions of people around her, she had the inclination to want to help others lead more healthy lives. Natalie has young memories of trying to mediate her family's health issues. As she got older, she realized she wanted her path to follow a road where she could have the ability to help people. She chose to pursue studies in pharmacy at the University of New England after realizing that this career was the perfect combination of her love of science, the medical field, and being able to make a positive impact on the lives of others.

Growing up, Natalie was academically focused and artistically creative, however she enjoyed spending most of her time outside, especially through camping and being out on the ocean. She never considered herself to be a part of the popular group of kids in school, but instead had close friends in several different social groups. When Natalie entered high school, she had her close friends but often felt invisible in her class and known generically as a very quiet, nice, smart, and tall girl.

It was not until Natalie took a hesitant step towards joining the high school volleyball team her freshman year

when she discovered a passion for this sport and developed a stronger presence and voice among her fellow classmates. Volleyball became Natalie's outlet; it brought her so much joy and it taught her valuable lessons in pushing yourself to achieve your goals. She played all four years in high school, both on the high school team as junior varsity captain and then the varsity captain, as well as on a year-round junior Olympic travel volleyball team with girls from different schools in Southern Maine. Volleyball taught Natalie how to channel her energy, become a leader, and be confident and vocal. Her mother and father were extremely supportive of her and had spent many weekend mornings getting up at 3 AM to drive her to tournaments in different states.

Natalie grew up in a home where some family members were touched by addiction and because of this, she was independent and strong-willed starting at a young age. Since she was a child, she was aware of the effects addiction can have on the social dynamics and mental health in a family. Towards the end of high school, Natalie found through shadowing experiences many areas of pharmacy practice that exist and the opportunities that pharmacists had to improve the health of others. The variability in this career interested Natalie, and upon entering pharmacy school, Natalie made a vow to herself to push beyond her comfort zone and seek opportunities and challenges to make her grow as a person and a future pharmacist.

At the beginning of pharmacy school, Natalie was hoping to start moving past her introverted nature that had previously held her back during her undergraduate studies.

Pharmacy school was a fresh start and the perfect opportunity to accept new challenges that she once would have shied away from. Moving out of her parent's house at the age of 20 was necessary for her success, happiness, and ability to tackle graduate school at her full capacity. She moved into her first apartment in June of 2015 prior to her first year of pharmacy school, where two older students, who were Alpha Zeta Omega brothers, were living.

Natalie joined the Lambda Nu Chapter of Alpha Zeta Omega during her first year of pharmacy school and because of that, her eyes were opened to a family of inspiring and ambitious individuals across the country. Her first convention was in Montréal, Canada, and after her attendance, she was at a loss of words how everyone she had met treated her like an old friend. Having both the love and support of her AZO brothers behind her and in front of her as inspiration, Natalie began to take on leadership roles within her College of Pharmacy.

During her three years of didactic studies, Natalie had diverse leadership roles within the University of New England College of Pharmacy. These roles include being the Student Society of Health-System Pharmacists P1 representative and Education and Programming Committee, being on the Phi Lambda Sigma Leadership Society Leadership Fair Committee, being one of the heads for the Charity Gala Committee, the head of her class Fundraising Committee, and College's P3 Celebration Cruise, being on the Lambda Nu Pledge Committee, and also being a Class Officer for three years, an officer in Rho Chi, and Lambda Nu's Corresponding Signare previous to becoming Lambda Nu's Directorum for the 2017/2018 fraternal year. She has also been a Director of Development within AZO during her last year of pharmacy school and has thoroughly enjoyed being involved in chapter and fraternity organization and development tasks.

Natalie was deeply invested in developing more meaningful clinical skills while at the College of Pharmacy, so she became SBIRT certified through the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration as well as Point of Care Testing Certified. She was deeply interested in the substance misuse population, and due to her family background, she attended numerous learning seminars throughout her time at UNE to learn how to better serve this population. Due to her investment in the University of New England and the presence that she had in the College of Pharmacy, she was awarded the University of New England Professional Citizenship Award for being a role model for other students.

For work experience, Natalie had worked in a variety of settings that have been extremely rewarding over the years. During her undergraduate studies at the University of New England, Natalie was the Men's Ice Hockey Travel Manager for two years and after her first year of undergraduate studies, she became a pharmacy technician at Maine Medical Center's New England Rehabilitation Hospital where she currently still works. During summer months for the first two years of her graduate studies, she worked for a professor in the Environmental Science Department at the University of New England and had a field research position in the topic of rooftop nesting sea gull populations in Maine. During this job, Natalie could

be found on the rooftops of buildings in Portland, Maine banding newborn Herring Seagull chicks and recording data on their populations across the city. In the Fall of her first two years in graduate school, she was a co-coach for the Cape Elizabeth Middle School Volleyball team. Helping these young girls develop both their volleyball and teamworking skills was a very rewarding job for her and being their coach was her way of giving back to Cape Elizabeth volleyball.

Her family had joked that Natalie was a crazy bird lady after she began her second job in pharmacy school working with birds at the Maine Audubon one summer. In this job, Natalie was based on a beach in Kennebunkport, Maine where she worked on collecting statistics and protecting the endangered Piping Plover species as well as offering education to those visiting the beach and local home owners. After her first Introductory Pharmacy Practice Experience, Natalie was hired at her previous site, Wilson's Drug Store, where she would pick up shifts as needed. Outside of these jobs, Natalie has enjoyed occasional help with a catering company based in Scarborough, Maine, as well as babysitting, housesitting, and animal watching for family, friends, and University faculty.

In her time as Directorum of Lambda Nu, Natalie had strived to make her brothers' involvement more meaningful and to make Lambda Nu a stronger family. Natalie wanted AZO to become a stronger organization due to the bond and dedication the brothers had towards each other, but also to their community. She encouraged senior brothers to tutor the younger students, expand their community service, push their fundraising to higher goals, and increase attendance to AZO interchapter events and conventions. From her personal experience, creating bonds with the brothers across the country is a crucial part to remaining invested in AZO past graduation. She wanted to have the brothers of Lambda Nu experience AZO to its fullest capacity by increasing their involvement and stepping out of their comfort zone like she had when attending her very first convention.

Natalie's success throughout her time at the College of Pharmacy was largely due to the confidence and skills she had gained by being a part of Alpha Zeta Omega. Whenever she needed support, her AZO brothers were the first ones to be there or message her. During pharmacy school, Natalie had gone through several medical setbacks and two surgeries, and without her brothers beside her, her journey would have been much more difficult. At the beginning of her graduate studies, she would have never anticipated standing where she is now and being surrounded by as many individuals that love and care about her. The love that AZO has brought into her life has deeply impacted her and she looks forward to continuing to grow within this fraternity as she graduates this May. As a naturally curious person, Natalie is looking forward to continuing her personal growth academically, spiritually, physically, and mentally by continuously looking for opportunities to reach higher goals. Post-graduation (May 2019), she will be a Resident at the University of Vermont Burlington Medical center and looks forward to continued involvement within Alpha Zeta Omega.





Counting Backwards from 100

A noteworthy 20th century achievement combines the medical sciences of pharmacology, cardiology and oxygen therapy to accomplish pain-free surgical procedures. The most prolonged and anatomically intrusive operation is achieved absent the patient's consciousness or cognizance of discomfort. The procedure is usually initiated by the anesthesiologist's directive to count backwards from 100, as the gaseous soporific mixture flows into the nostrils of the prostrated individual. Their primary motive was to sustain each other, assuring that all would complete the formidable curriculum, graduate, and enter the domain of pharmacy practice.

A hundred-year retrospective is far beyond the scope of this column. I would be remiss in any attempt to describe the achievements and dedication of so many officers and members, spanning a century, through whose vision, commitment and perseverance AZO prospered and flourished, during depression, war, social upheaval, innovative and nontraditional professional roles and responsibilities, and the invaluable inclusion of women into the society. Counting backwards through the century to appreciate the immense accomplishments of so many stalwart fraters would be folly. Appreciating those who preceded us is indeed praiseworthy.

On this occasion of our imposing centennial festivities, proud and exuberant AZO fraters have assembled in the City of Brotherly Love, anticipating an elegant convention that will inspire an already instilled yearning for a lifelong association and viable interaction with the Alpha Zeta Omega Pharmaceutical Fraternity. Attendees should anticipate the fraternity's splendid future of abundant social activities, continuing education opportunities, conferences in exciting and appealing venues, coordinated travel agendas, sporting events, local chapter meetings and programs, and a myriad of occasions, most significantly enhancing camaraderie among colleagues practicing in diverse disciplines of the extraordinary pharmacy profession. Thus, it is understandably attractive to pharmacy students and alumni who desire AZO's grand and noble qualities of peace, friendship and brotherly love.
